EXTRACURRICULARS AND CLUBS

Model United Nations: MUN is a club that works to solve world problems while representing a country from around the world at various conferences in the state of Michigan. Open to all grades, runs mid-September through April. (Mrs. O'Rourke & Mrs. Wade)

Business Professionals of America: BPA is a national student organization that allows students to compete in over 50 different events that focus on the field of business. BPA is open to any student who is currently in or has taken a business class. Active October through May. (Mrs. Paxton)

National Honors Society: NHS is a service learning organization. Students with a 3.7 or higher cumulative GPA are invited to apply toward the end of their sophomore and/or junior year to become members. Students can complete individual and group hours all year long. (Ms. Kidder)

PALS: Peer Assistance & Leadership students are caring, motivated group of students who demonstrate good leadership skills. The role of the group is to support new students, give peer-to-peer support, and participate in fundraisers. For students in grades 10-12. (Mrs. Ereg)

Student Government: Student government is a group of elected students who plan school activities such as Homecoming, Feb Follies, Spirit weeks, etc. They also participate in various local charitable and service activities in the community. It runs between the end of August through June with elections each spring. (Ms. Richards)

Mu Alpha Theta: A national high school and junior college mathematics honors society (minimum 3.25 math GPA and overall 3.0 GPA minimum needed) whose goal is to promote the enjoyment and understanding of mathematics and its uses in the real world. We do this through a variety of projects and activities in and around Williamston. Runs from late September to mid-May. (Mr. Rasmus)

German Exchange: Each fall, students from Germany come to Williamston to stay with host families and while they are here they participate in various activities in and around the Williamston area. Our return exchange happens after school is out in June. Students travel to Germany to stay with their students from the fall in Braunschweig, Germany and spend three nights in Berlin. (Mrs. O'Rourke)

Quiz Bowl: Team Trivia (answering trivia questions in teams!) that meets once a week for practice, and occasionally an extra day a week to meet and play against teams from other schools. The season begins in September and usually runs until March (later if we make states!) (Mr. Ellis)

Tutoring/Homework Lab: Homework Lab is an opportunity to study, tutor, or get help with any school subject. Homework Lab meets before school on Tuesdays and after school on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays in the library. (Mr. Walker, Ms. Geiger, & student tutors)

Drama: Drama is an after school club that puts on one musical a year. Students need to tryout for the spring musical near the beginning of second semester. (Ms. Snyder)

Helden: Helden is an open choir for all male voices. It meets Tuesdays and Thursdays. It is active all school year, rehearsals are from 7am -7pm. (Ms. Snyder)

Madricals: This is an audition choir, it meets after school 3x a week. (Ms. Snyder)

Trip Abroad: Not a school sponsored organization, but available to Williamston students: History teachers take trips abroad every year or every other year (Mrs. O'Rourke & Mrs. Wade).

Peer2Peer Lunches: Open to all students during A and B lunch. Students will learn about different disabilities including but not limited to autism, Down Syndrome, hearing impairments, visual impairments, etc. through hands on activities and videos. It occurs once a month. Students can bring their own lunches sign up ahead of time for pizza.

Poetry Club: Poetry Club is a group effort in critiquing and assessing both the poetry of well-known poets and ourselves. Anyone is welcome; we are here to improve upon any skills you may have. (Mrs. Williams)

Electronics Club: A group of students who want to build some electronic devices and learn some basic electronics fundamentals. Student group that meets in the homework lab. (Mr. Walker)
