Our Responsible Thinking Philosophy

Students have the right to learn and teachers have the right to teach in safety.

No one has the right to disrupt, to prevent other students from learning or to violate the rights of others.

What is RTP?

RTP is a process by which students are taught to monitor their own behavior by taking responsibility for what they do.

Rather than telling students what to do they are asked what they are doing in relation to the rules or standards of where they are.

This is our opportunity to teach students how to think on their own and create their own effective plans rather than someone else doing the thinking for them.

RTP is a tool for our students and staff to employ in order to grow and learn in a consistent and safe environment.

Through the use of The Responsible Thinking Process, students will learn how to self-manage their behavior.

How it Works

- 1. A student disrupts during class time or is being unsafe in the classroom or hallway.
- 2. The student is asked the first set of questions;
 - 1. What are you doing?
 - 2. What are the rules?
 - 3. What happens when you break the rules?
 - 4. Is this what you want to happen?
 - 5. What will happen the next time you disrupt?
- 3. The student either:
 - 1. Chooses to respond by correcting the inappropriate behavior and continues in class.
 - 2. Chooses to continue behavior and is asked the second set of questions.
 - 1. What are you doing?
 - 2. What did you say would happen next?
 - 3. Where do you need to be?
- 4. If the student is asked the second set of questions they are automatically sent to the Responsible Thinking Classroom.
- 5. While in the RTC the student is given the opportunity to complete a plan of action to correct the inappropriate behavior. Once a plan has been completed the student is allowed to return to class.
- 6. If they disrupt again, the questions will be asked one time and they will be sent to RTC.

Responsible Thinking Process Offenses

(Ask questions – send to Responsible Thinking Classroom after warnings checked on behavior documentation form)

Below are some examples of minor and major offenses where the RTC will be utilized:

Minor RTC Offenses

- Inappropriate language
- Minor physical contact
- Talking when others are talking
- Talking during independent work time
- Not following directions
- Property misuse
- Electronic violation

Major RTC Offenses

- Abusive language
- > Fighting or physical aggression
- Defiance or disrespect
- Harassment and bullying
- > Inappropriate touching or exposing
- Lying and cheating
- Possession of weapons
- > Theft
- Vandalism or property damage

Classification of Offenses

Disruption/Distraction:

Talking in class
Walking around the room
Tapping pencil
Slamming books on desk
Shouting out in class

Disrespect:

Inappropriate language or gestures Insubordination, not following a simple direction

Safety:

Running in the hallway
Tipping back in chair
Improper use of equipment
Pushing/shoving
Throwing things

Refuse:

Refusal to do assigned work or complete an assigned task

General Procedure for Dealing with Problem Behaviors
